The ice machine is located between rooms 23 and 24.

Per California law, smoking is not permitted anywhere inside the Lodge building, or on Lodge decks or patios. The Lodge sun-deck is available for smoking.

IN THE SUMMER MONTHS

Our beautiful sundeck, located across from room 27, is available for you to enjoy and is a wonderful place to relax with a great book. We offer deck-side food and beverage service during restaurant hours, so sit back and enjoy the sunshine. The luxury of deck-side service is available by calling extension "0." Ski lockers are available for our lodge guests. The lockers are located to the left of the main entrance door located under the sign that says "employee sauna," (no it's not really a sauna). A key is available at the front desk to get into the room and into your assigned locker. For rooms 40 through 43, you will find an area in your room to store your ski equipment.

Lake Tahoe Facts & Trivia

LAKE TAHOE FACTS

- Elevation: 6,229 feet above sea level
- Length & Width: 22 Miles long with a width of 12 miles
- Shoreline: 71 Miles (California 42 miles, Nevada 29 miles)
- Capacity: 122,160,280 Acre-ft. of water
- Surface Area: 193 Square miles (122,200 acres)
- Depth: 1,450 Feet maximum, with an average of 989 feet
- Water Temp: 68° F maximum, 41° F minimum
- Only Outlet: Truckee River at Tahoe City

LAKE TAHOE TRIVIA

- Lake Tahoe was formed by faulting, fractures in the earth's crust allowing blocks of land to rise and sink.
- If Lake Tahoe were tipped over, the water would cover all of California to a depth of 14½ inches.

- Lake Tahoe is as long as the English Channel is wide.
- Lake Tahoe is fed by 63 streams and two hot springs, and has an average of 1,400,000 tons of water evaporating every day.
- Ice may sometimes form along Lake Tahoe's shorelines, but the lake has never been known to freeze over.
- Lake Tahoe is the eighth deepest lake in the world, and second deepest in the U.S. (The deepest U.S. lake is Crater Lake, Oregon at 1,932 feet)
- As an "interstate navigable waterway" Lake Tahoe is protected by the U.S. Coast Guard (and is reputed to be the most desirable Coast Guard duty station in the world).
- Unlike most bodies of water in the U.S., Lake Tahoe's water does not flow into the ocean. The Truckee River flows east through Reno and drains into Pyramid Lake, Nevada.



Healthy Living in the High Sierra

When visiting a higher elevation than your body is accustomed to, several normal body reactions can take place. It is not uncommon for visitors to feel fatigued or dizzy and headaches are common.

Here at Sunnyside we are at an elevation of 6,229 feet and the oxygen is quite a bit thinner than that at sea level. If your body does not have enough time to acclimate to this higher altitude, even the healthiest of individuals can feel altitude sickness. Here are several symptoms that can occur, as well as helpful tips to minimize their effects.

SYMPTOMS OF ALTITUDE SICKNESS

- Dizziness
- Increased Fatigue
- Shortness of Breath
- Headaches
- Nausea

TIPS FOR MINIMIZING ALTITUDE SICKNESS

- Drink plenty of liquids and double your water intake
- Get plenty of rest (not just sleep, relax!)
- Go easy on strenuous exercise and activities
- Always carry bottled water while exercising
- Never drink surface water (river, streams, lakes) unless you use a proper filtration device (this tip should be followed at any elevation)
- Remember, it takes two weeks for your body to acclimate to a higher elevation, so go easy on the strenuous exercise!



Just a Short Drive to Tahoe History

Ehrman Mansion & Nature Center – Sugar Pine Point State Park

Located on Hwy 89, 7 miles south of Sunnyside. Sugar Pine Point offers a beautiful setting for picnicking and hiking, and houses the colossal Ehrman Mansion. The mansion was formerly the vacation residence of a wealthy San Francisco family.

Emigrant Trail Museum & Bookstore – Donner Memorial State Park

12593 Donner Pass Road, Truckee
582-7892

Just off I-80 at Donner Lake Exit, about three miles west of Truckee. This memorial park contains interesting exhibits, artifacts, and presents movies and slide shows relating to the Donner Party.

North Lake Tahoe Historical Society Watson Cabin Museum

560 North Lake Blvd, Tahoe City
583-8717

This living museum is located in the center of Tahoe City, two miles north of Sunnyside. Montgomery Watson built the cabin in 1909 for his son and bride. The occupants of the cabin were some of the first people to live at the Lake year-round. The Watson's planted the lilacs growing under the sunroom windows.

North Lake Tahoe Historical Society & Gatekeepers Museum

130 West Lake Blvd, Tahoe City
583-1762

Located at William B. Layton Park, just before Fanny Bridge, two miles north of Sunnyside. The water master who controlled the water flow out of Lake Tahoe lived in the original version of the cabin. Today, it contains a world-class collection of Indian baskets with close to 1 million dollars. A new Native American pottery exhibit is on display as well.

Fanny Bridge

Located two miles north of Sunnyside before you reach Tahoe City. This bridge got its name from everyone leaning over the railing to look at the giant rainbow trout below. It is illegal to fish from the bridge, but get a piece of bread to feed them and watch them go wild!

Truckee-Donner Historical Society & Old Jail

Located in downtown Truckee, The Truckee Jail was built in 1875 and is one of the West's oldest. It was in use until 1964 and is now open as a museum on the weekends.

Vikingsholm Mansion & Visitors Center – Emerald Bay State Park

9999 Emerald Bay Road, Tahoma

Emerald Bay is located south of Sunnyside on Hwy 89 and impossible to miss. It offers the most picturesque views on the lake. If you don't mind a steep 1-½ mile hike back up, the trail to Vikingsholm leads from the parking area. Vikingsholm is a magnificent replica of a 38 room Scandinavian country house build in 1929.

Lake Tahoe Visitors Center

Hwy. 89 Emerald Bay

Located south of Sunnyside of Hwy 89, the Visitors Center is five miles past Emerald Bay and is marked by a forest service sign 'Lake of the Sky Visitor Center'. This is wonderful area for nature hikes. The best asset to the Visitors Center is the Stream Profile Chamber, where you can view fish in their native habitat through underwater windows. Throughout the summer you can view Lake Trout. In the fall you can view the spectacular Kokanee Salmon as they spawn their way up the river.

Olympic Museum at Squaw Valley's High Camp

581-7256

The Olympic Flame and Tower of nations still marks the entrance to Squaw Valley, USA and is located eight miles north of Sunnyside on Hwy 89. Take the beautiful tram ride up 2000 feet to High Camp. Visit the ice-skating rink, bungee tower, restaurants, as well as the museum of the 1960 Olympic Winter Games.

Call for hours and operations, as some historical sites may be open seasonally.



Just for Kids

IN THE WINTER MONTHS

Why not try the snow tubing hills? At these two hills you don't even need to hike up the mountain. Granlibakken 583-4242; Squaw Valley 583-6955

For great views and a steep sledding hill, join a ton of other families and go to Highway 431 (Mount Rose Highway). From the main highway, you will see the fun on your left as you approach the summit.

For a good time right outside your lodge room, you could make us a snowman or snow angel. Ask any of the Sunnyside staff for pointers!

Tahoe City Winter Sports Park In the center of town kids can enjoy multiple activities in this one location. Sledding, cross country skiing, snowshoeing and ice skating. There is also a full service bar and restaurant to enjoy.

IN THE SUMMER MONTHS

T S Enterprises History

Restaurateurs Rob Thibaut and Sandy Saxten had the right quotient for success when it comes to opening prosperous new restaurants. Their dreams of developing, building and personally operating a limited number of restaurants has come to fruition through hard work and shared goals. Both Thibaut and Saxten's success comes from growing at a slow pace, waiting for ideal real estate, assisting in each new restaurant's architectural design, and by personally training all general managers. Thibaut and Saxten merged their interests in 1975 and formed T S Enterprises (T S), which continues to grow today.

T S RESTAURANTS HISTORY

1977

T S chose Lahaina, Maui, as their area, where they were able to obtain the last waterfront parcel. They opened **Kimo's Restaurant** in the spring of 1977. Since its opening, Kimo's has become nationally renowned. *Time Magazine* touted it as one of the five best restaurants on Maui. Equally glowing articles have appeared in *Gourmet Magazine* and newspapers from San Francisco to Boston. In a short period Kimo's has become a Lahaina institution and is the home of the original "Hula Pie."

1981

Jake's Del Mar is right on the beach in Del Mar, California, a town famous for its summer horse racing season. Since opening in January of 1981, the restaurant has been acclaimed as one of the top restaurants in North County San Diego by *San Diego Home and Garden Magazine*. Jake's offers fresh seafood, pasta, and top quality steaks.

1983

T S opened **Leilani's On The Beach**. The beautifully designed building features open air decks and sits on the main beach at the center of the famous Ka'anapali Resort on Maui, Hawaii. The upstairs dining area has distinctive specialties ranging from charbroiled local fish, to kaiwe wood smoked ribs, to shrimp Polynesian style. The downstairs seafood bar and cocktail lanai are only a few feet from the sand and are popular with locals and the younger beach crowd.

1986

In January of 1986, T S opened **Keoki's Paradise** in Poipu Beach, Kauai. This seafood restaurant has been touted as one of the most unique and tropical settings on the island. (You enter over a bridge with waterfalls on both sides, crashing into a pond below.) Keoki's menu is similar to Kimo's, known for its fantastic fresh fish. The lounge appears to be built on an island and has a very popular "seafood and taco bar."

1987

In June 1987, T S remodeled and re-opened **Sunnyside Resort** on the West Shore of Lake Tahoe. This charming resort includes 23 guest rooms, a 25-boat marina, and a stunning view of Lake Tahoe from almost every seat in the restaurant. Sunnyside has been a landmark in Lake Tahoe since 1947 and has become a Tahoe classic as the best restaurant and lodge on the lake. In fact, we celebrated our 60th anniversary. Sunnyside's contemporary style menu offers great steaks and fresh seafood.

1992

Duke's Canoe Club in Waikiki was opened in December of 1992 and is the site of the original Outrigger Canoe Club where Hawaii's premier waterman, Duke Kahanamoku, became a legend. Located on the beach in Waikiki with spectacular views of Diamond Head and the ocean, there is no better spot to recapture the romance of Old Hawaii. Board surfing actually originated directly in front of this restaurant. Original surfboards and canoes, old

photos from the Kahanamoku family, early Hawaiian shirts and all kinds of artifacts create the unique feeling of Duke's Canoe Club in Waikiki. The menu and style of service presents the Hawaiian specialties from fresh fish to Poki rolls to a great cheeseburger.

1994

Hula Grill opened in June of 1994 next door to Leilani's on Ka'anapali Beach at Whaler's Village. With a prime oceanfront view and an atmosphere of a Hawaiian style home, this is reminiscent of Maui's charm around the 1940's. Featuring regional Hawaiian seafood, the menu is straightforward, fresh, flavorful, and truly representative of these isles. The food is presented in a style that could be called Hawaiian home style cooking. It reflects the diverse cooking traditions of the island people. Included in the menu are fish of the Pacific, vegetables and herbs from the slopes of Haleakala, pizzas and breads from the wood-fired brick oven and dinners grilled over the kaiwe wood grill.

1995

Duke's Canoe Club On Kauai, located right on the sands of Kalapaki Beach in front of the Marriott Hotel in Lihue, reopened after hurricane Iniki hit in June 1995. A waterfall bordered by tropical plants forms small streams as it actually flows through the restaurant into a pond filled with Koi at the lower bar level. Duke's is reminiscent of an earlier, more romantic period of Hawaii and named after the founder of modern day surfing, Duke Kahanamoku. There is a great deal of Duke memorabilia in the restaurant: photos of Duke with famous celebrities, his surfboard, his original koa canoe, and many other mementos. The menu specializes in Hawaiian specialties with the same menu as Duke's Waikiki.

1996

T S opened Duke's Malibu in August of 1996. **Duke's Malibu** has brought the excitement of Hawaii and surfing to mainland USA. The spectacular location on Pacific Coast Highway offers over 300 feet of oceanfront dining with memorabilia of both Hawaii and

California surfing history. The Barefoot Bar looking south to the lights of Santa Monica is a great spot for a drink and light food with friends.

1998

Duke's Huntington Beach opened in September, 1998. The restaurant, located at the base of Surf City's famous pier, which is surrounded by seven miles of beaches, and the thriving Main Street downtown area. This restaurant features two outside dining areas as well as an outside bar area, a 360 degree bar, and memorabilia of Huntington Beach's surfing history. This theme blends the history of Southern California surfing, the Aloha Spirit so well known in Hawaii, as well as memories of Duke himself. It is a fun concept that makes the views all the more spectacular. The menu features fresh fish and steaks similar to Duke's Malibu.

2004

Hula Grill Waikiki opened above Duke's at the Outrigger Waikiki in June 2004. Overlooking famed Waikiki Beach, Hula Grill Waikiki offers diners spectacular views of the beach, ocean and Diamond Head. Like its sister restaurant on Ka'anapali, Hula Grill Waikiki is reminiscent of a plantation style home offering the warm ambiance of a bygone era. The menu features Hawaii Regional Seafood. Hawaiian fresh fish and locally grown produce are combined to create menu offerings that are vibrant and flavorful. Simple, traditional cooking techniques reflecting the diverse cultures of the people that came to the Hawaiian Islands showcase the ingredients.

2009

Duke's Beach House opened in December 2009 on North Beach in Ka'anapali, offering the feeling of being a guest of Duke Kahanamoku in his beach-side Maui vacation home. The open-air restaurant features stunning views out to the Pacific Ocean and of the islands of Lanai and Molokai. At the restaurant's Ohia Bar, guests take in the ocean breezes while sipping exotic cocktails under palapa umbrellas.

2015

Duke's La Jolla on the iconic Top of the Cove site on Prospect Street in La Jolla. Duke's La Jolla offers sweeping views of the Pacific and the San Diego coastline from its perch above the La Jolla Cove. The striking building showcases the oceanfront setting with floor to ceiling sliding glass doors and two outdoor dining decks. Like the other Duke's restaurants, Duke's La Jolla honors its namesake, Duke Kahanamoku, Olympic gold medalist, father of modern international surfing and Hawaii's Ambassador of Aloha. The restaurant also celebrates the Southern California beach lifestyle and the history of surfing in San Diego. The menu features wood grilled fresh fish and premium meats with flavors influenced by Hawaii and the Pacific Rim.
